#### A Warm "Welcome Home"

In times of uncertainty, grief, and isolation, we find strength and joy in making music. — Anonymous

Over the past 24 months, most, if not all, of us have experienced the above emotions, and we've wondered when we will be able to sing or listen to live sacred choral music again. Those who regularly attend our concerts inquired, "When is the next OTM Festival concert?" Our singers asked, "Are we going to have a concert in 2022? We miss singing so much! How can we keep from singing?" Today, it gives us great joy to say to you, "Welcome home! Today is that day!"

In this our 13<sup>th</sup> season, we want to express our gratitude to everyone who has supported us through their participation, professional advice, attendance, and their financial support. It has been our joy to prepare and present these programs to you.

We welcome Dr. Jeff Reynolds as our Choral Conductor. He shares the following:

How apropos that after two years away we come together again with the theme "How Can We Keep from Singing!" Taylor Davis' powerful anthem by the same name opens our concert and reminds of the importance of music in our lives. In a moving arrangement of "Amazing Grace," Mack Wilberg captures the beauty and power of this beloved hymn. Perhaps never more poignant is the verse "Yea, when this flesh and heart shall fail, and mortal life shall cease; I shall possess, within the veil, a life of joy and peace." At every British coronation since that of George II in 1727, "Zakok the Priest" has been sung. Known as one of the "Coronation Anthems" it is as powerful as it is exuberant. "O God Beyond All Praising" by Dan Forrest features a melody familiar to many – based on the tune THAXTED. "My Eternal King" by Jane Marshall is arguable one of the best-known anthems of our generation. It is as thrilling to sing as it is to listen to.

The "Missa brevis Sancti Joannis de Deo" has the nickname "The Little Organ Mass" because of the prominent organ solo in the Benedictus. Dedicated to St. John of God, this short mass has few text repetitions and, in fact, dispenses with the requisite Latin text of the mass by "telescoping" or having different choral sections singing different texts at the same time! This was all from an order from Haydn's patron that the entire mass not last more than 45 minutes.

"The Road Home" by Stephen Paulus has become a balm for singers throughout this time of pandemic. Its poignant text yearns for home – a return to our safe places and normalcy. It ends so beautifully: "rise up, follow me, I will lead you home." For us, today feels like home.

Returning to OTMF are our Festival Organist and Accompanist, Ms. Karen Krekelberg and our Soloist, Mrs. Sadie Goodman. You will enjoy getting acquainted with these wonderful musicians in the next few pages of this program book.

Special thanks to Dr. Thomas R. Smith, Professor Emeritus of Music at Auburn University, who presented our pre-concert lecture this afternoon.

Please silence all cell phones, pagers, and other electronic devices so that all may enjoy the performance without distraction. Any recording of this concert is strictly prohibited.

It has been requested by the Festival Chorus that all refrain from applause until the end of parts II and III of the program.

And lastly, as we sing our congregational hymns together, remember the words of John Wesley, "Sing lustily and with a good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength."

#### Dr. Jeff W. Reynolds, Guest Conductor

**Dr. Jeff Reynolds** currently serves as Minister of Music at Riverchase United Methodist Church, as well as Associate Professor of Choral Music and Conducting at UAB. He holds a BM from Samford University, a MM from Southwestern Theological Seminary, and a DMA from the University of Illinois.

As Music Director of the International Cathedral Music Festival, singers and instrumentalists from all over the world have performed under Dr. Reynold's direction in such historic venues as Salisbury Cathedral; Southwark Cathedral; Christ Church, Oxford; St. Mary's Church, York; St. Giles Cathedral, Edinburgh; Domkirche, Eisenstadt; St. Etienne-du-Mont, Paris; and the Votivekirche and St. Stephen's Cathedral in Vienna.

We Are the Music Makers: The Choral Music of David Brunner was recorded by the Schola Cantorum of Florida and is evidence of his desire to provide contemporary composers a high-quality voice for their works. Dr. Reynolds served as lecturer on the music of Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven at the Seminar fur Klassiche Musik in Eisenstadt, Austria, where choirs under his direction were selected Chorus-in-Residence for 1991, 1992, and 1994.

#### Dr. Sadie Goodman

Soprano Sadie Goodman has enjoyed performing with opera companies such as Opera Birmingham and the Aspen Music Festival's Opera Theater. Sadie is a former member of the Cathedral Church of the Advent Choir, and she and her husband John are parishioners of the Advent. While a student at Northwestern University, Sadie worked closely with composers John Musto and Ricky Ian Gordon on the roles of Mid-Aged Woman and Rosasharn in their respective operas Bastianello and The Grapes of Wrath. Other favorite roles include Ciesca in Gianni Schicchi and Second Spirit in Die Zauberflöte. Sadie has worked closely with composer Terre Johnson as the soprano soloist for the premieres of his works Missa Femina (2014), Song of the Captive (2016), and most recently The Wind (2017), which premiered in Carnegie Hall in New York City.

She holds Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance and Master of Music Education degrees from Samford University, a Master of Music degree in Voice and Opera from Northwestern University, and a Doctorate of Musical Arts degree from the University of Alabama. For years she served on the faculty at Judson College as Assistant Professor of Music where she taught Applied Voice, Vocal Pedagogy, Opera Workshop, Vocal Literature, Music History, Class Voice and Diction for Singers. Currently she teaches Arts in Society, Applied Voice and Graduate Opera Literature at her alma mater, Samford University.

She also enjoys performing with Over the Mountain Festivals and the choir of the Eternal Word Television Network. Recent discography includes a CD and DVD of the EWTN choir entitled "The Family Christmas Special," in which they perform Advent and Christmas chants and carols, and "Great Hymns of the Faith," a recording of beloved Catholic hymns and chants.

John was a 1970 graduate of Woodlawn High School and a 1974 graduate of Auburn University. He was known as a "salesman of the first order" and was a long-time employee of Metro Trailer in Pelham, Alabama. He enjoyed fishing, reading, photography, and spending time with family and friends.. He was a faithful servant of his church, Cahaba Springs Presbyterian, where he sang in the choir and served as an Elder. He also enjoyed singing in the choir and serving as Treasurer for the Board of Directors of the Over the Mountain Festivals.



John was also a faithful servant of Alcoholics Anonymous and freely shared his personal story with countless others as a message of hope. At the heart of this message was a lesson to "die to self" and take it "one day at a time." Community, service, and fellowship were important to John. He volunteered at the Jimmy Hale Mission, a homeless shelter in downtown Birmingham, and would often give people a ride to church from JHM on Sundays. John is and will continue to be greatly missed!
